Dental Therapy: Scope of Practice

WHAT CAN DENTAL THERAPISTS DO?

Dental therapists can perform the most commonly needed preventive and restorative dental care services (not an exhaustive list):

✓ ORAL ASSESSMENTS AND TREATMENT PLANS

- ✓ PROPHYLAXES, FLUORIDE AND SEALANTS
- CAVITY PREPARATION and amalgam or composite restorations

EMERGENCY PALLIATIVE TREATMENT



SIMPLE EXTRACTIONS* of primary teeth and periodontally diseased permanent teeth

✓ PREPARATION AND PLACEMENT OF PREFORMED CROWNS on primary teeth

PROVIDE CARE in collaboration with supervising dentist (similar to general supervision)

Q: With less training than dentists, is it safe for dental therapists to perform "irreversible procedures"? A: YES. Dental therapists are trained to the same standard as dentists on a smaller number of procedures. Dental therapists are licensed in 50 other countries and states in the U.S. In January 2013 the ADA's Council on Scientific Affairs conducted a systematic review of oral health outcomes produced by dental teams incorporating midlevel providers, finding "the results of a variety of studies indicate that appropriately trained midlevel providers are capable of providing high-quality services, including irreversible procedures such as dental extractions*and restorative care."



Permanent teeth to be extracted must be at least +3 mobile and must not be fractured, impacted, or unerupted.
